
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EASTERN WOODLANDS INDIANS

The Indians of North and South America did not all live in the same way. Such things as a dry or wet climate, the presence of forests or deserts, mountains or plains, and nearness to oceans or lakes helped determine how a group of Indians lived. For example, the Indians of the dry areas of what is now Arizona and New Mexico lived very differently from the forest Indians of New York and New Jersey. However, no matter where the Indians lived they learned how to use the things around them to provide food, clothing, and shelter.
