MEMBERS OF CONGRESS WILL DISCUSS THE BILL.

AFTER THE DEBATE, THE HOUSE WILL HOLD A VOTE.

IF THE BILL RECIEVES ENOUGH VOTES, IT'S SENT TO THE OTHER HOUSE OF CONGRESS.

THE OTHER HOUSE WILL ALSO DEBATE THE BILL BEFORE THEY'LL HAVE A VOTE.

WHEN BOTH HOUSES AGREE, THE BILL IS THEN SENT TO THE PRESIDENT



IF THE PRESIDENT SIGNS THE BILL, IT THEN BECOMES A LAW.
