THE PROCESS FOR MAKING A LAW IS ACTUALLY PRETTY SIMPLE.

IN ORDER TO CREATE A LAW, SOMEONE IN CONGRESS NEEDS TO COME UP WITH AN IDEA.

THE PERSON WHO CAME UP WITH THE IDEA WRITES A BILL.

THE BILL IS DISCUSSED IN A COMMITTEE BEFORE IT'S SENT TO EITHER HOUSE.

IF THE COMMITTEE FEELS
THAT THE BILL SHOULD BE
CONSIDERED, THEY'LL SEND IT
TO THE HOUSE FOR DEBATE.

MEMBERS OF CONGRESS WILL DISCUSS THE BILL.

AFTER THE DEBATE, THE HOUSE WILL HOLD A VOTE.

IF THE BILL RECIEVES
ENOUGH VOTES, IT'S SENT TO
THE OTHER HOUSE OF
CONGRESS.

THE OTHER HOUSE WILL ALSO DEBATE THE BILL BEFORE THEY'LL HAVE A VOTE.



WHEN BOTH HOUSES AGREE,
THE BILL IS THEN SENT TO THE
PRESIDENT

IF THE PRESIDENT SIGNS THE BILL, IT THEN BECOMES A LAW.
